Sample Questions To Ask Your Child: What is the key point the author is trying to make? What is the topic of this text? This page? This section?

What is the difference between this text and this one? How are the texts alike? What were the key details in this text? How are the ideas the same in both texts? How are the ideas different?

You can practice this standard with your child using multiple texts on the same topic. As children get older and begin conducting research, it is important for them to understand that one source will not give them all the information they may need on a topic. Allow your child to check out a book on a topic and also read an internet article on the same topic. You can also watch educational videos about a topic and then read more about it. It is important to expose your child to informational texts so they can discover their own interests and passions.


Examples of informational text you can use:
